PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to inform Advisory Committee Members of the outcome of the recent City of Darwin elections and the membership of the 24th term of Council.

KEY ISSUES

- On 23 August 2025 City of Darwin elections were held for Lord Mayor and Elected Representatives across all wards
- On 6 September 2025 NT Electoral Commission announced the appointment of the new Lord Mayor and six new Elected Members with seven Elected Members returning for an additional term
- On 30 September at their first Ordinary Council Meeting Councillor Peter Pangquee was appointed as the nominated representative on this Advisory Committee to 30 September 2026, with Councillor Patrik Ralph being appointed as the Alternate representative

DISCUSSION

On 23 August 2025 City of Darwin elections were held for 24th term of Council for the City of Darwin. The elections were for Lord Mayor and Elected Representatives across all wards. City of Darwin local government area is made up of a Lord Mayor and four wards with each ward having three elected representatives.

On 6 September 2025 NT Electoral Commission announced the appointment of the new Lord Mayor and six new Elected Members with seven Elected Members returning for an additional term.

The new Lord Mayor is Peter Styles.

Chan Ward is represented by two returning Elected Members - Councillor Peter Pangquee and Councillor Ed Smelt and a new Elected Member - Councillor Julie Fraser.

Lyons Ward is represented by two returning Elected Members - Councillor Sam Weston and Councillor Mick Palmer and a new Elected Member - Councillor Nicole Brown.


Richardson Ward is represented by one returning Elected Member - Councillor Jimmy Bouhoris and two new Elected Members - Councillor Shani Carson and Councillor Edwin Joseph.

Waters Ward is represented by two returning Elected Members - Councillor Sylvia Klonaris and Councillor Kim Farrar and one new Elected Member - Councillor Patrik Ralph.

On 30 September at their first Ordinary Council Meeting Councillor Peter Pangquee was appointed as the nominated representative on this Advisory Committee to 30 September 2026, with Councillor Patrik Ralph being appointed as the Alternate representative.

For this Advisory Committee, it may be of interest to note that the 24th term of Council of City of Darwin has three First Nations people elected, including a previous community representative of this Committee and a returning Elected Member representative. This Council also boasts the youngest person elected to City of Darwin.

RECOMMENDATIONS

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to introduce the new Reconciliation Coordinator for City of Darwin and to provide an overview of recent activity.

KEY ISSUES

- Ineke Wallis was appointed Reconciliation Coordinator for City of Darwin and began in the role part time in July 2025.
- Since the last Reconciliation Advisory Committee Meeting several projects have been delivered across City of Darwin relevant to the Reconciliation portfolio.
- City of Darwin have submitted their RAP Impact Reporting and been in contact with Reconciliation Australia about the next steps in our Reconciliation journey.

DISCUSSION

Ineke Wallis was appointed Reconciliation Coordinator for City of Darwin and began in the role part time in July 2025. Ineke is passionate about advocating for First Nations people and future generations. Ineke worked for East Arnhem Regional Council for 7 years as the Governance and Executive Manager. One of the tasks included working with Traditional Owners (Yolngu people), Elected members, Community and Reconciliation Australia to implement a successful Reconciliation Action Plan. Ineke has also represented First Nations people of Australia at the United Nations in Geneva, advocating for basic human rights and the relationship to Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs.

Since starting at City of Darwin Ineke has met with key staff, undertaken a variety of mandatory training including the cross-cultural training delivered by Cross Cultural Consultants. This training is mandatory for all new staff at Council aligning with our Reconciliation commitments. This training opens eyes and gives new staff a *real* understanding of First Nation history. She has met with many of the Reconciliation Advisory Committee members, ran the First Nations Staff Support Network and Implementation Group meetings, reviewed outcomes against the outgoing RAP, attended NTIBN's Aboriginal Economic Development Forum and has continued exploring work to develop a Larrakia design for City of Darwin work uniforms.

Since the last Reconciliation Advisory Committee Meeting in May 2025 several projects have been delivered across City of Darwin relevant to the Reconciliation portfolio across areas such as HR, Learning and Capability, Arts and Culture, and Sponsorship.

These activities include:

- First Nations Recruitment Plan, First Nations Cultural Learning Plan and First Nations Career Development Plan (printed copies will be available at the meeting)
- Ongoing development of the Larrakia online training modules with Moogie Down and Larrakia Nation Aboriginal Corporation
- Copyright agreements and public art outcomes with First Nations Artists Attachment 1
- Delivery of the final sponsorship under current agreement with Larrakia Nation Aboriginal Corporation for NAIDOC Week

In addition, the Reconciliation Network for the NT continues to progress with Executive Manager Community and Cultural Services participating in meetings to develop the draft constitution and formally establish the NT Association. Cross Cultural Consultants are currently leading this project and anticipate its first formal meeting in November to establish.

Reconciliation Coordinator has also been invited to present at the First Nations Leadership Summit in Darwin on the 12 November 2025.

City of Darwin submitted its RAP Impact Reporting on 23 September 2025, which reviews the impact of our RAP on a variety of areas of Council. Refer to **Attachment 2** which includes correspondence from Chief Executive Officer - Simone Saunders to CEO Reconciliation Australia - Karine Mundine and City of Darwin's Strategic reporting against the RAP for January to June 2025. An overview of First Nation Suppliers and Expenditure for July 2024 to 2025 will be available at the meeting. Reconciliation Coordinator has also been in discussion with Reconciliation Australia regarding the timing of the development of our next RAP and we are compiling our reporting on outcomes across the life of the RAP. It is proposed that we will register for our next RAP in February 2026 and allow up to 12 months to develop the first draft of this document. City of Darwin will review the requirements to move to a Stretch RAP during this time. Refer to **Attachment 3**.

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Trent Bundirrik Lee

Guidance of One's Past

Trent Bundirrik Lee is a proud Larrakia man through his Nardang father, grandmother, Alap and as a part of the Cubillo family. Bundirrik was about seven when he was taught by his father to paint their traditional way. As a prominent member of Darwin's Street Art scene, he has also been the recipient of many commissions both local, national and international.

Located in Bicentennial Park, between the playground and mirragma gunugurr-wa, the artwork, wrapped on amenities, is titled 'Guidance of Ones' Past', and draws upon the artist's connection to culture.



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Tara Darcy - Maningrida

Tara is a member of the Free Space Studio, a visual arts program run by Arts Access Darwin that supports artists with disability through workshops, access to materials, studio space and opportunities.

The light pole wraps include vibrant motifs from Tara's artwork *Maningrida Community*, inspired by her coastal upbringing in West Arnhem Land. The artwork features colourful turtles, birds, planes, houses and people.



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Sarrita King - Dancing

Sarrita King lives in Darwin where she spent most of her life as a young person. The Northern Territory continues to be the source of much of her creative inspiration along with the stories her father shared with her, the late William King Jungala. The Gurindji tribe lead the first successful land rights claim following 1966 strike action at Wave Hill station. After a nine-year dispute, a portion their homelands were returned to the Gurinji people in 1975.

Of her work Sarrita has said...this artwork is a burst of Indigenous symbols. These have been created to be in all different shapes and directions. When the U shape is used it symbolizes a person. When they are painted in this way coming together and facing random directions it means people are dancing.

City of Darwin RAP Impact Reporting 2025

I am pleased to present information to you on the impact of City of Darwin's second <u>Innovate</u> Reconciliation Action Plan 2023-2025.

In addition to completing our online reporting requirements I wanted to outline some of our journey and the significant changes this process has had on our operations.

As a result of City of Darwin's Innovate Reconciliation Action Plan commitments, we now have a comprehensive and considered approach across our organisation.

Some of the outcomes include:

- A Memorandum of Understanding with Larakia Nation Aboriginal Corporation and a strong working relationship across multiple areas of Council.
- An external Reconciliation Advisory Committee made up of First Nations members that I am proud to sit on as the only non-Indigenous member.
- A First Nations Staff Support Network and an internal RAP Implementation Group.
- Attendance by a representative of our First Nations Staff Support Network at the national Reconciliation Australia Conference.
- An annual Reconciliation Week program (this year delivered in partnership with a local First Nations Event Company).
- An annual Reconciliation Week and NAIDOC Week grant program for First Nations applicants only.
- Multiple online and in person training on Reconciliation, First Nations history, Cross Cultural Awareness and Anti Racism by The Australian Human Rights Commission as part of our mandatory training for all staff.

- A dedicated First Nations identified position as Reconciliation Coordinator.
- A Larrakia Cultural Training program delivered in person to Elected Members of Council within their induction program.
- Sponsorship of key First Nations Businesses including Larrakia Nation Aboriginal Corporation and Northern Territory Indigenous Business Network.
- A First Nations Cultural Learning Plan.
- A First Nations Recruitment Plan.
- Annual NAIDOC program including a City of Darwin stall at Larrakia Nation's NAIDOC March.
- A First Nations employment enrichment and inclusion policy.
- A First Nations governance engagement and advocacy policy.
- Regular participation in Reconciliation Australia's Workplace Barometer.
- A First Nations Directory to guide staff engagement.
- Founding membership of the NT Reconciliation Network.

Multiple frameworks have been initiated from our Reconciliation Action Plan, and the actions have significantly supported positive outcomes and achievements for Reconciliation including an uplift in our expenditure in First Nations businesses. I have attached some of our framework documents to this letter for your consideration.

Proudly I am also pleased to inform you of an uplift in the number of First Nations people elected to Council in our recent elections. Our previous elections saw one First Nations member voted in to Council, and one elected later in the term in a by-election. During our recent elections in August this year four First Nations candidates ran, and three First Nations Elected Members have been appointed – across three different wards.

City of Darwin intend to focus on a couple of outstanding items from our outgoing Reconciliation Action Plan in the coming months prior to starting engagement on developing our next RAP in 2026.



RECOMMENDATIONS

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to provide the Committee with information regarding the Closing the Gap – Independent Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander led review.

KEY ISSUES

- Closing the Gap is an Australian Federal Government initiative aimed at reducing disparities between First Nations people and non-Indigenous Australians in key areas such as child mortality, health, education, employment and life expectancy. Closing the Gap targets were formally introduced in 2008 following the 2005 Social Justice Report
- The 2020 Closing the Gap National Agreement outlines 17 socio economic targets and four priority reform areas
- While some progress has been made against the targets many are not on track or yet to be met and **Attachment 1** outlines the independent review delivered in June 2025 by First Nations organisations
- The Review at **Attachment 1** outlines a role for Local Government

DISCUSSION

Closing the Gap is an Australian Federal Government initiative aimed at reducing disparities between First Nations people and non-Indigenous Australians in key areas such as child mortality, health, education, employment and life expectancy. Closing the Gap targets were formally introduced in 2008 following the 2005 Social Justice Report.

Signatories to Closing the Gap include Commonwealth Government, State and Territory Governments and the Australian Local Government Association (ALGA).

The 2020 Closing the Gap National Agreement outlines 17 socio economic targets and four priority reform areas. The Priority reform areas are:

- 1. Formal partnerships and shared decision-0making
- 2. Building the community-controlled sector
- 3. Transforming government organisations
- 4. Shared access to data and information at a regional level

While some progress has been made against the targets many are not on track or yet to be met and **Attachment 1** outlines the independent review delivered in June 2025 by the Coalition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peak Organisation (Coalition of Peaks) - representing the community-controlled sector servicing communities across Australia. The Coalition of Peaks is made up of more than 80 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community-controlled peak and member organisations across Australia, that represent over 800 First Nation organisations.

The Review at **Attachment 1** outlines the role for Local Government, the report identifies findings and recommendations for local government, including:

Key Finding 6: Governments have yet to commence any genuine transformative work

Local Government has not yet commenced any quantifiable work as a Party to the Agreement, despite a small number of positive examples driven by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people or their organisations. This limited commitment to the new ways of working under the National Agreement is the barrier to transformative change and the realisation of the human rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. A human rights-based approach that truly relinquishes total governmental control and adequately invests in community-controlled solutions as the new normal is part of governments' responsibility to addressing this deficit.

• Invest in community-controlled solutions

Recommendation Two: Drive genuine transformation within governments through systemic and structural changes

2d) Local Government needs to step up to their Closing the Gap commitments under the National Agreement.

There is an argument to be made for consideration of existing jurisdictional funding allocations dedicated to local government for recognising the needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, so they are resourced to meaningfully contribute to the implementation of the National Agreement. Until sustained funding is provided, many local governments will remain unable to step into their responsibilities as genuine partners. At the same time, local governments must strengthen their capability and cultural competence to engage respectfully with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. This includes building relationships, improving accountability, identifying and addressing all forms of racism, embedding the Priority Reforms in local planning and decision-making processes. For local government peak bodies and many local governments, this will require examination of how to undertake this work in the absence of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander elected representatives or staff.

- Resource communities to contribute to Closing the Gap
- Strengthen Council capability and cultural competence to engage respectfully
- Build relationships

- Improve accountability
- Identify and address all forms of racism
- Embed Priority Reforms into local planning and decision-making processes

6. Combined national and jurisdictional efforts are lacking

"I think there's a perception that local governments do not deal in closing the gap." [Assembly Delegate]

Local government was singled out by many participants as the level of government not yet engaging in any impactful way. Relationships with government differ at the three levels, but the overwhelming view is that Local Government is not yet invested in the Closing the Gap process. In the majority of local governments, the lack of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander representation at elected or staff levels is seen as a major issue. There are opportunities for the local government sector to do much more under Closing the Gap, particularly in regional, rural and remote areas. "...the Shire (local government) has very few Aboriginal people and therefore isn't representative of the community." [Yarning Circle participant] "Yeah, better you get down on your hands and knees if you want something from them (the local council)." [Yarning Circle participant]

- Undertake more collaboration across all areas of Priority Reform Two (building the community-controlled sector)
- Engage with community meaningfully and impactfully
- Increase Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander representation at elected and senior staff levels in Council.
