BACKGROUND

The team update report is provided to inform Council of operational activities conducted across the key portfolios.

The City of Darwin has a long history of being a city rich in diverse cultures and nationalities. The Community Development and Liveability teams are committed to ensuring equal access to Council services regardless of cultural background. The Team participate in a process of continual review to ensure programs are responsive and accessible to all members of the community.

Programs are designed to be inclusive by acknowledging and addressing language barriers, cultural appropriateness of activities, key service sector partnerships, and employee cultural awareness skills.

Some key milestones that celebrate continued commitment to an inclusive approach include:

- Provision of in language promotional material.
- Completion of a study investigating the Fun Bus service within multicultural communities and a discussion with recommendation to improve the service.
- Development of a Healthy Living for new arrival information booklet in partnership with refugee support agencies.

DISCUSSION

DISABILITY SERVICES

Disability Advisory Committee

The Disability Advisory Committee (DAC) met on 2 October and the 20 November 2014. Key topics discussed include the On-Street Parking Review, advice to Council regarding an Outdoor Dining request from the Laneway Cafe, and a four month trial for Zone B parking for people with an Australian Disabled Parking Permit.

International Day of People with Disability (IDPWD)

The DAC organised a launch for the naming of the Peter Mahony Fishing Platform on IDPWD, 3 December 2014. This platform is specifically designed for wheelchair access. The Fishing Platform is fitted with adjustable panels to allow casting from a low height. The panels are kept locked for safety associated with the reduced barrier

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height, however keys to unlock the adjustable panels are available free of charge. The key for the Peter Mahony Fishing Platform is the same key that accesses the two Liberty Swings, located in Lake Alexander Regional Playground and Jingili Water Gardens Regional Playground. Further information and an application form to obtain a permanent key are available on Council's website. The Community Services Officer (CSO) is responsible for administering the keys.





Accessible Flooring

The Accessible Flooring is now set up to be loaned by community groups putting on community events. The Flooring is used to assist with access for people with mobility issues where a flat surface is needed. Information about the flooring and an application form can be found on Council's website and flyers to promote the Flooring are available in Customer Services. The loaning of the Flooring will be administered through Customer Services. There is a \$100 refundable cleaning/security deposit and no charge for the hire as this is provided as an in-kind support.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Community Grants

City of Darwin's Community Grants Program provides funding for projects that directly benefit the Darwin community. Each year Council allocates \$100,000 for community projects. The second round of the 2014/15 Community Grants program opened on 13 September and submissions closed on the 17 October 2014. There were 26 applications received requesting a total funding amount of \$160,696. Council approved 12 applications for funding for a total amount of \$49,086. The Lord Mayor held a presentation morning tea for the successful recipients on Friday 12 December.

International Women's Day 2015

Planning has commenced for International Women's Day (IWD) 2015. City of Darwin in partnership with United Nations NT will continue to deliver the IWD Walk and Morning Tea. The event is booked for Saturday 7 March, meeting at the steps of Parliament House at 9am to commence the walk at 9.30am. The event includes a walk through the CBD which is led by the Darwin City Brass Band and the NT Police, this is followed by morning tea and entertainment at Parliament House. International Women's Day is a global day to celebrate the economic, political and social achievements of women.

YOUTH SERVICES

Youth Advisory Group

City of Darwin Youth Advisory Group (YAG) provides a voice for local young people in areas of Council and community decision making. YAG met on 8 October and 5 November 2014

Key activities included:

- Represented Council at the National Ethnic Media Broadcasting Council Youth Media Conference in Darwin. The conference was attended by over 150 young people from culturally diverse backgrounds all around the country.
- Participated in a partnership with Tectonic Youth Radio to provide YAG with regular broadcasting training and YAG segment opportunities.
- On Saturday 20 December, YAG rolled up their sleeves to make a pre-Christmas working bee contribution to Ozanam House, St Vincent De Paul. YAG voted on making their community contribution at Ozanam House in Stuart Park, through painting the pavement and tidying the community garden where over 100 individuals and families would be spending their Christmas Day.

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 In partnership with LAUNCH, YAG has begun planning events and activities for Youth Week. The following activities have been selected by YAG to plan:

- Ted Talk Series.
- Couch Surfing Initiatives,
- Tectonic Radio Show Live Broadcast from Couch Surfing, and
- Youth Homelessness Matters Day awareness raising activities.

City of Darwin Youth Strategy 2015-2020

The Youth team has continued its widespread consultation to inform planning of Council's 2015-2020 Youth Strategy. Initiating contact with local high schools, Council staff undertook 5 school visits to talk to local young people about their perceptions of Council, their community and importantly, what issues they felt were most significant to themselves and their peers.

Questions identified key issues such as body image, suicide and self harm, and alcohol and other drug use as the top three issues impacting them and their peers. Using new audience response technology proved to be a fun way to collect information from large groups and probe discussion on key issues. Over 200 young people were consulted from the following schools:

- Dripstone Middle School,
- Darwin High School (years 10 and 11) ,
- Kormilda College, and
- St Johns College

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The current total number of young people consulted for 2015 – 2020 Youth Strategy now totals approximately 400 students, with further consultations planned in early 2015.

LAUNCH

LAUNCH is Council's primary annual youth leisure program, including training, workshops and events developed for young people by young people. Sitting alongside the LAUNCH program is LAUNCH Media activities providing opportunity for creative expression, awareness raising, profiling, and promotion of youth events, activities and support services throughout Darwin.

An overview of training, workshops, collaborations and events is provided in the following table.

October 2014 School Holiday Program

AFL Footy Clinics

The youth team partnered with Northern Territory Thunder and Food Bank to take over TIO stadium, delivering two days of AFL school holiday clinics. The goal of the taster program was to provide local boys and girls aged 12-20 with a positive, safe and easily accessed AFL experience. Over 60 young people aged 12-17 (30% Girls)

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attended the clinic.

Throughout the clinics Thunder mentors were able to engage and inspire local at risk youth. All participants commented that they wanted more chances to play AFL, had learned new skills and made new friends.

Get That Job - Barista Course

The 'Get That Job' Program is designed for young people aged 15-21 years of age. The Barista course aimed to create real opportunity for young people to gain relevant hospitality tools and targets both current school and university students who are seeking employment over the holiday break; as well as young people who wish to increase their knowledge with a view of seeking long term employment. Two one day courses were held with 30 young people attending.

Two participants have reported to have gained full time employment as baristas after the course

LAUNCH Mindil Market Pop Up - Quarterly Zine launch, Mindil Beach Markets Thursday 30 October

LAUNCH Media's hot of the press Youth zine made its debut at the final Mindil Beach Market for 2014. The LAUNCH market pop up included the Zine launch and a range of youth focused leisure activities including a dress up photo booth, screen printing, badge making workshop and pop up Op Shop supported by Anglicare.

Four young people involved in LAUNCH media helped coordinate, promote and document this event.

LAUNCH Pop Up Gig Harriet Place Friday 14 November

LAUNCH Emerging Producer Cassandra Mariano was supported by Youth services to create a vibrant end of year youth gig at Harriet Place activating Harriet Park and taking advantage of Mayfair Gallery Space. The event included performances by local youth bands OK Kaleidoscope, Love Patrol and electro pop outfit DJ Fish Slappa. The inclusion of the rap battle and a live art battle was a hit with both participants and the audience. The BBQ catering was supported by Casey House, whilst YAG (including Alderman George Lambrinidis) and several youth volunteers manned the badge making stall and the smoothie bikes blending up tropical goodness.

LAUNCH Media at the Golden Galah Fist Full of Films Saturday 15 November

LAUNCH media harnessed the opportunity to support young Darwin film makers committing to the first stage of the Fist Full of Films/LAUNCH partnership which supported the student film category award.

In 2015 LAUNCH media will continue to work with Fist Full of Films to develop workshops and seed funding opportunities for young Darwin filmmakers that celebrate and enrich our community and explore our history.

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<u>LAUNCH Media Zine meetings.</u> Weekly

Meetings were held each Tuesday in October focused on refining the distribution of Youth zine and point of pick up stands. November meetings were dominated with reviews of style and developing online version of the Youth Zine.

LAUNCH Youth Events Coordinator Training Program 20 December 2014

A call out for applicants to participate in the 2015 Youth Events Coordinator Training Program was announced, with a closing date for application 16 January 2015. The program has been developed in consultation and partnership with key stakeholder within local industry including training facilitators and presenters

LAUNCH Media - Tracking Online Engagement

Facebook

Over the reporting period there was an increase of 'likes' of our page to 1150. Generally spikes in Facebook page views correlated with LAUNCH events being promoted. Over 400 people interacted with the page as of the 31 December the page.

Website

Websites visits grew steadily over the quarter with average of 263 visitors each month. The website has been updated and visitors are able to subscribe to updates online.

LAUNCH MEDIA- Community Event documentation

 LAUNCH media participants were employed captured the Sister City Halloween event through photos and video. This was their first experience capturing events of this nature and included organising photo and media consent forms with event attendees.

Management of Gig Gear and Stage Kit Resource

During the quarter the Youth & Community Events & Resource Officer focused on developing procedures, OHS and storage solutions for Gig Gear management.

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ARTS & CULTURAL DEVELOPMENT

Arts and Cultural Development Advisory Committee (ACDAC)

The Committee held a Meeting 13 November 2014. A revised draft Terms of Reference and Meeting Procedures was presented to the committee.

Community Art Space

Exhibitions for October/November/December

Children's Exhibition

An exhibition was held in October to celebrate the launch of Children's Week. Children aged 2 to 12 were invited to submitted their art, to be displayed in the community space. The launch event attracted 80 guests.

• 'In the Studio' Exhibition

An exhibition by artists from Darwin Community Art's 'Free Studio Space' project. The studio space is an inclusive and supportive visual arts project focused on the development of studio skills for young artists with disabilities. The exhibition attracted 60 guests.

• Red Cross – Cyclone Tracy 40th Anniversary

As part of the Commemoration Program, Red Cross presented an exhibition of photos by photographer Ramon Williams not seen before in the public domain. The exhibition provided an opportunity to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of Red Cross in Darwin and included a display for cyclone preparedness as part of an education element to the exhibition. The exhibition attracted 50 guests.

Youth Art Exhibition

Planning, research and development occurred with the Youth Services Trainee in preparation for the launch of a Youth Arts Project in January. This project has been developed with the support of Mayfair Gallery, Harriet Place as an alternative to the annual exhibition at the Civic Centre. This project will enable staff to test, trial and evaluate the success of the Mayfair Launch to ascertain how best to proceed in building skills and opportunities in the sector.

Public Art

Temporary Public Art Commissions are progressing with two commissions being awarded through the annual program. A further and final commission will be

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promoted for delivery by the end of this financial year. The Coordinator Arts and Cultural Development has been working with artists through the development phase of these commissions including permission from owners of property, design development and insurances.

A further round of permanent public art commissions will be promoted early in 2015.

A meeting with the Public Art Panel is planned for early 2015 to address the development of a Public Art Plan, maintenance, repairs, deaccessions, audit and budget allocations for the remainder of this financial year and beyond. The outcome and recommendations from this meeting will be presented to ACDAC.

Cyclone Tracy 40th Commemorative Program

The Coordinator Arts and Cultural Development was responsible for a number of key projects within the Commemorative Program.

- Christchurch Cathedral Porch Plaque: A bronze cast plaque has been placed in the portico at Christ Church Cathedral. The plaque provides the community with an opportunity to pay tribute to those affected by the cyclone.
- **Facing Tracy' Digital Program:** Facing Tracy is an interactive media project that gives the opportunity for all of Darwin's citizens to be involved in their commemoration of Cyclone Tracy. The project has allowed people to contribute images of Darwin and themselves to be placed in a collective picture mosaic. There are two main interactions with the project: the booth that tours around Darwin and the web where people can see the results.

A final celebration has been planned for 12 February at the Darwin Entertainment Centre. Participants in the project have been invited to attend and view the final image through a large scale projection.

• Christmas Tree Light Installation Commission: Additional lighting components for the Commemoration were commissioned. A special feature which formed a circle surrounding the tree, with 66 individual lights represented each life lost as a result of Cyclone Tracy.

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National Local Government Cultural Forum

City of Darwin, hosted the 4th National Local Government Cultural Forum over two days in October. The forum was attended by representatives from across the sector including, Arts and Cultural, Local Government Association, the Australia Council Arts Funding, Assistant Secretary, Ministry for the Arts, and staff from the Cultural Development Network. The meetings were facilitated by the Hon Fred Chaney.

Meetings worked through a secretariat report on priority areas including structures supporting integrated planning for arts and cultural policy, review of existing data, features of existing cultural development projects.

Arts Plan 2015-2020

Work on the Arts Plan has continued to identify the needs and aspirations of the local arts and creative industries sector and planning for the arts and cultural development program accordingly.

The renewed Five Year Arts Plan will capture a vision for Council's arts and cultural development program for 2015-2020 as well as presenting a framework for implementing proposed strategies.

Asia Pacific Arts and Cultural Forum

The Coordinator Arts and Cultural Development attended the Asia Pacific Arts and Cultural forum 'Trading Ideas' at the Darwin Entertainment Centre over two days. The forum included a presentation on the *Creative City* by the Lord Mayor.

Civic Park Cultural Usage Plan

Scoping and costing of a power upgrade for Civic Park has commenced as a stage one action.

FAMILY & CHILDREN'S SERVICES

Child Care Centres

Council sponsors seven child care centres in the provision and maintenance of the buildings. The Family and Children's Services Coordinator facilitated a meeting with the centre directors and Council's Building Maintenance team on 11 November 2014 and carried out maintenance inspections on the seven child care centres this quarter.

In 2013 the Australian Government established a Productivity Commission Inquiry into Child Care and Early Childhood Learning. On 30 October 2014 the government received the final report. The government will consider the Productivity Commission's final recommendations and the report will be publicly tabled within the required 25 Parliamentary sitting days.

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Community Centres

Council has three community centres (Lyons, Malak and Nightcliff), that cater for a variety of activities. The Community Centres floors were stripped and polished in the reporting period. In October Lyons Community Centre's hall was internally painted.

During November the Coordinator and Building Supervisor carried out maintenance inspections on Lyons, Nightcliff and Malak Community Centre. The Coordinator facilitated a meeting with Nightcliff Community Centre tenants in December.

Fun Bus

The Fun Bus continues to provide high quality mobile play group services for children 0 to 5 years, their parents and carers. During October to November the Fun Bus operated at the following outdoor venues:

During December and January school holidays the Fun Bus does not operate. The Fun Bus resumes on the 28 January 2015.

In October, one of Council's Children's Services Trainee resigned and moved interstate, finishing her traineeship seven weeks early. With support the trainee was able to complete all tasks required to complete her Certificate III in Children's Services with Bachelor Institute of Indigenous Tertiary Education.

Fun in the Parks

Council's Fun in the Parks is a school holiday program focused on primary school aged children. The program operates from 10am to 12.30pm every Monday, Wednesday and Friday of the school holidays.

Fun and Games program:

The Fun and Games program supported four community groups during October-December; Aboriginal Medical Services Alliance NT (AMSANT), SIDS and Kids NT, Carers NT, Department of Veteran's Affairs. The Fun and Games were also utilised at Council events by the Sister Cities, Fun in the Parks, libraries and the Richardson Ward event.

Fun Bus program:

On Friday 21 November the Fun Bus program provided children's activities for the Cultural and linguistic diversity (CALD) parent group at the Multicultural Council NT organised by Relationship Australia Northern Territory.

Fun in the Parks program:

Sunday 14 December the Fun in the Parks provided face painters to Christmas for Kids event organised by Centacare and Territory Childcare Group.

National Children's Week

National Children's Week is an annual event celebrated in Australia during the fourth week in October. SISTER CITIES PROGRAM

Ambon

The Ambon Sister City Community Committee met 23 October 2015 and reviewed projects undertaken in July – September including; reciprocal student exchange and Ambon Night. The Committee will hold an extended planning workshop 29 January 2015 to develop an action plan for the 2014 – 2016 term.

Anchorage

Pumpkins, lollies and scary costumes were plentiful at this year's Anchorage Sister City Community Committee Halloween Family Fun at Dusk community event on 25 October 2014. Families participated in creepy crafts, trick or treating and the infamous Haunted House. Many happy participants took home prizes for best dressed, melon carving and pumpkin decorating and savoured delicacies such as 'eye ball' desserts and American chilli dogs.

The Anchorage Sister City Community Committee met 3 December 2014 and reviewed current projects. The Committee agreed to hold an extended planning workshop 4 February 2015.

Dili

The Dili Sister City Community Committee met 14 October 2014 and discussed committee expectations and developed an agreed focus for the 2014 – 2016 Term. In November City of Darwin donated a keyboard to Action for Change Foundation in Dili to assist with their Music 4 Peace program.

Haikou

Winner of the Haikou Sister City Cup Elmer Lee (Li Zongyang) sampled the best of Darwin life and culture during his whirlwind visit in October. Elmer was awarded the trip to Darwin by the Mayor of Haikou after his hotly contested win in the English language competition. The Sister City experience has had a significant impact on Elmer, a student from Hainan University, who was subsequently offered an internship at the Haikou Office of Foreign Affairs. Elmer's trip to Darwin was his first to a foreign country and has developed his interest in public management and broadened his horizons.

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Lord Mayor led a delegation to Haikou 19 - 21 November for the purposes of furthering the Sister City relationship. A detailed report of the delegation has been submitted separately to the Committee.

City of Darwin will commence work on the 'Life as a Teenager' performance project in early February.

Kalymnos

Working in partnership with key government and non-government organisations, City of Darwin will host a free and accessible community information event, Welcome to Darwin, targeting the Greek community, Saturday 7 February 2015 at the Greek Orthodox School. Family friendly games, activities and light refreshments will be provided to help create a harmonious, informal atmosphere to enable new members of the Darwin community to feel safe in accessing resources. Over 20 service providers will be in attendance and provide translated materials and bilingual staff where possible. Kalymnos Sister City Volunteers will meet and greet community members on arrival and assist in connecting people with services.

Sector Networking

Senior Community Development Officer – Liveability (SCDOL) continues to maintain representation on the International Engagement Coordinator Group which meets monthly.

Harmony Day

A planning committee made up of a representative from each Sister City Community Committee is currently planning a joint Sister Cities event for Harmony Day. The event will be held in the week of 16 – 22 March.





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





Swimming Pools

General Operations








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Casuarina and Parap Pools remained open throughout the quarter. Their operational hours were extended to manage additional demand and swimmers during the closure of Nightcliff Pool (21 September to 7 December) for the plant room construction project. Overall attendance for the second quarter 2015 was lower by 12,000 attendees compared to the same quarter last year, mainly due to the closure of Nightcliff Pool. However, attendance for both Casuarina and Parap Pools was greater for 2nd quarter 2015 (7,200 and 9,500 people respectively) compared to the same quarter last year, indicating the transfer of patrons to these locations while Nightcliff Pool was closed.

A number of community incentive programs approached Recreation Services for inkind support by way of swimming pool vouchers as prizes. NT Police received 50 single-entry concession pool passes to be awarded to children seen to be doing the right thing (October), Healthy Darwin gave away 20 single-entry concession and 2 single-entry adult pool passes for the winners of the Face of Healthy Darwin competition (November), Council's Libraries were given 20 single-entry family passes (2 adults, 2 children) for their Summer Reading Club in December and Swimming NT was given 30 five-entry pool vouchers as prizes at its end-of-year swimming carnival.

Infrastructure Improvements

Nightcliff Pool

The plant room construction project was completed in December with the installation of a new Perlite filtration system, and a low-salt chlorinator system that are more water-efficient than the previous system. The water quality has significantly improved since the new filtration system has been operational. Work to remediate the site around the new construction, including the removal of the previous pump house on the cliffs and re-situating the power supply around pool deck is still ongoing.

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Casuarina Pool

Sixteen new starter blocks were installed to replace the existing blocks. The new starter blocks include an adjustable track start system utilised in all elite competitions. This project was funded by Council as a new initiative in response to a request from Swimming NT for improved infrastructure for training and competition purposes.

Special Events

<u>Nightcliff Poo</u>*I* – An open day was held on 7 December to celebrate the re-opening of the venue following the plant room works.

<u>Casuarina Pool</u> – The Richardson Ward Christmas Party was held on 6 December and the Healthy Darwin aqua aerobics program commenced on 8 December.

Ovals

General Operations

Wet Season Allocations commenced 1 October and go through until 31 March 2015. Twelve ovals have been allocated across three sports (AFL, Soccer and Gaelic) totalling 156 hours per week usage in October and November. An additional booking was made by Football Without Borders in December, this organisation started a men's group soccer training session at Malak, bringing the total hours to 159 hours per week.

Bagot Oval was taken offline for this quarter to allow the Turf and Irrigation team to undertake a program of works to maintain the surface. Kahlin Oval has also been set aside during cricket's off-season for programmed works.

Projects

Nightcliff Oval Fence

A new top and bottom rail chainmesh fence (similar to that at Gardens Oval One) is scheduled to be installed around the boundary line of Nightcliff Oval in March/April. This is at the request of the Nightcliff Sports Club, along with their affiliates Nightcliff Football Club and Nightcliff Cricket Club and supported by their Peak Sporting Bodies, to replace the pine log fence currently there. This type of fence will enhance the amenity of Nightcliff Oval and provide security and protection against unauthorised vehicular access. Infrastructure is managing this project and a letter to the residents has been prepared for mail-out. The project is funded through a grant from the Department of Sport and Recreation.

Jingili Oval Goal Posts

New AFL goal posts have been installed at Jingili Oval in response to the St Mary's Football Club's request. The previous posts had been removed due to safety concerns of players kicking balls onto Jingili Terrace and then chasing after them into traffic. This concern has been alleviated through player behaviour modification in that all junior goal-kicking practice will only be undertaken at the other end of the oval, towards the school grounds adjacent.

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Other Recreation Projects

Re-development of the Jingili Water Gardens Skate Park

The tender for design documentation and construction of the Jingili Water Gardens Skate Park was awarded to Convic in late October. Due to the inclement weather conditions of the Wet Season, the demolition and construction phase of the project is scheduled for late-March/April 2015.

Super Sunday

The Super Sunday Recreational Bike Count was held on Sunday, 9 November; it was the second time it was conducted in the NT. The final report is yet to be received and will be discussed in next quarter's report.

Smoothie Bikes

The Smoothie Bikes have been moved from Healthy Darwin to the responsibilities of the Recreation Services Officer at the start of October. Eleven Smoothie Bikes bookings were received this quarter from a range of community groups and departments in Council to be used for community events to promote physical activity and healthy eating in a novel manner.

HEALTHY DARWIN

After a successful dry season program to start the new Healthy Darwin ActiveLife@TheTop, classes and activities transitioned to a wet season program from 1 November. Community members linking in with the program continued to grow over the reporting period with a total of 281 residents now registered for the program and a further 200 have liked the Healthy Darwin Facebook page since the start of the new program on 1 August.

Weekly low-cost activities

The calendar program continues to provide a diverse mix of activities for all ages and abilities. During the quarter the team worked with local exercise providers to transition to a wet season program of activities encouraging residents to keep active

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all year round. 8 subsidised weekly activities were held (attended by over 94 community members).

 Healthy Moves for Seniors, Coconut Grove (ongoing into Wet Season program)

- Tai Chi, The Gardens (ongoing into Wet Season program)
- Lunchtime Circuit, Christ Church Cathedral (ongoing into Wet season program at new location)
- Group Circuit, Koolinda Park, Karama (Dry Season Aug Nov)
- Tween Fit, Casuarina Secondary College (Dry Season Aug Oct)
- Stretch and Tone, Malak Community Centre (Dry Season Aug Oct)
- Yoga, Lyons Community Centre (Wet Season Program Nov ongoing)
- Aqua Class, Casuarina Pool (Wet Season Dec ongoing)

In addition to the subsidised activities Healthy Darwin continues to team up with fitness providers, sporting clubs and community organisations to deliver the calendar program, with 6 new providers joining the program in November. 73 weekly sessions are currently promoted through the calendar, across the municipality, ranging from Swing Dancing to Zumba.

Workshop Program

Heading into the Wet Season, the workshop program focused on providing residents with the skills, knowledge and confidence to grow and use fresh local produce.

In the reporting period the following 6 workshop programs were delivered, with a total of 97 people registering for the workshops:

- Grow Your Own Curry Paste (Malak Community Garden)
- Market Tour and Taste (Rapid Creek Market/ Jingili Community Garden)
- Market & Garden Cooking (Alawa Primary School)
- Cooking Family Favourites (in partnership with Balance Diet Centre, Karama Primary School)
- Wet Season Gardening (Lakeside Drive Community Garden)
- Make Your Own Curry Paste (Alawa Primary School)

Feedback from workshop evaluations indicated 90% of participants have learnt new skills and 100% of participants enjoyed the sessions.

Community Events

Healthy Darwin continues to partner with local organisations and community health services to provide opportunities for residents to be more aware of their health and learn more about local produce.

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Healthy Darwin partnered with GULP NT (Growing & Understanding Local Produce) to hold the Face of Healthy Darwin competition, which encouraged children to use local tropical produce to create a face. We received a fantastic response from a number of schools and individuals, with Ludmilla Pre-school awarded the winner.

Photos of each of the entries were then displayed at Mindil Beach Markets at a joint stall with GULP NT and Casuarina Community Care Centre. Over 60 community members took the opportunity to have a mini health check, pedal the smoothie bike to make a fresh smoothie and learn more about the Healthy Darwin program, whilst sampling some of our locally grown produce.

Bagot Women's Group

Healthy Darwin has continued to support the Bagot Women's Group to undertake and develop their skills and knowledge in healthy lifestyles. The women participated in a number of key activities over the reporting period:

- Partnered with TEAM health to hold a pampering day and a candle and soap making workshop aimed at building strong mental health.
- Worked with Healthy Darwin staff to design a regular exercise program that can be done in their homes and as part of the group.
- Celebrate the end of the year with a Christmas party held at Stokes Hill Wharf and Waterfront. The day allowed for reflection of progress during the year and goals for 2015, including continuing to work towards a Women's Resource Centre.

COMMUNITY EVENTS

Christmas in the Mall

Held on Saturday 6 December in Raintree Park with jumping castles, face painting and entertainment from local artists, the Lord Mayor was in attendance and Santa did a walk through the mall for photos with children. This event was not well attended and the format and activities will be reviewed for Christmas 2015.

Santa's Cave

A magical Santa's Cave was created in a shop in The Mall as a new activity for the 2014 Christmas events. In air-conditioned comfort, children could come in and have

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their photo taken with Santa and enjoy the creation of a magical cave. From Monday 15 December to Wednesday 24 December 9.30am – 12.00pm, an average of 200 families came through the doors each day. This event was a great success with positive feedback from the community and should be continued.



Cyclone Tracy 40th Anniversary

All-Faith Commemorative Service, Christ Church Cathedral

Wednesday 3 December, 5.30 – 6.45pm

This service commemorated those who suffered and lost their lives and give thanks to those who returned or rebuilt Darwin. All denominations were represented with 300 people in attendance, and the program included a number of speakers, readings, prayers, poems and song.

Christmas Tree Lighting, Raintree Park and The Mall

Friday 5 December, 5.30pm – 7.15pm

This year, in addition to the traditional tree lighting, a lighting display was unveiled and adorned the Lord Mayor's Christmas Tree to commemorate the 40th Anniversary of Cyclone Tracy. Approximately 200 people were in attendance for the ceremony. Darwin City Brass band provided entertainment

Special Preview - Blown Away, Darwin Entertainment Centre

<u>Friday 5 December 2014, 7.30pm – 9.15 pm</u>

This exclusive event was held in The Studio, Darwin Entertainment Centre to a capacity audience of 320. The ABC with City of Darwin hosted a special preview event for Darwin audiences. A Q&A session with the Director, documentary participants and special guests was held immediately after screening.

<u>Lord Mayor's Christmas Tree – Dimming the Lights Ceremony, Raintree Park and The Mall</u>

Wednesday 24 December, 6.30pm – 7.30pm

250 people attended a special ceremony was held around the Lord Mayor's Christmas Tree and Raintree Park, commemorating the night Cyclone Tracy devastated Darwin. The program featured local singer Penny Hart singing carols. Recipients of the Cyclone Tracy community grant Deaf NT performed. The Lord Mayor dimmed the lights of the tree to acknowledge the lives lost and the survivors.

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<u>Commemorative Plaque – Unveiling, Porch at Christ Church Cathedral Friday 26 December, 10.30am</u>

The Lord Mayor unveiled a commemorative plaque in the portico area of Christ Church Cathedral. This will accompany an earlier plaque City of Darwin had unveiled following the construction of the new Cathedral. Survivors in attendance were acknowledged and a morning tea was held after for the 80 people in attendance.

BACKGROUND

The purpose of this report is to provide information detailing events and comments relating to City of Darwin Libraries.

DISCUSSION

Loans are statistics collected monthly from the library management system and they include all items loaned, including books, newspapers, DVDs, etc. and our in-house loans of computers, laptops, X-boxes and PlayStations etc. The loan statistics do not include our e-book loans; these are collected from the suppliers of our e-books. Statistics for January 2015 will be included in following quarterly report.

Customer visits are counted at each library through a door counter and recorded daily. Attendance at events include story times, author visits, library tours etc.

Our total loan statistics for the quarter are down 3% from 2013 and down by 6% in 2012.

Total visit statistics for the quarter are up 3% from 2013 and down 3% from 2012.

Attendance at library events for the quarter is up 18% from 2013 and up 32% from 2012.

DECEMBER 2014 AND JANUARY 2015 INCLUDING SCHOOL HOLIDAYS

ACTIVITIES REPORT

City and Nightcliff libraries were closed during the Council shut down period over the Christmas break and Casuarina and Karama libraries remained open. Both libraries were very busy for the three days 29 to 31 December when City and Nightcliff libraries were closed. Casuarina had 2560 people through the library on those three days; an average of 853 per day.

Collection Development

Our e-books from Overdrive continue to grow steadily with an average circulation of 350 items per month. There are over 1200 items in the Overdrive e-book collection. During the past year 325 new borrowers registered for eBooks, with an increase of 500 more items borrowed in 2014, than in 2013.

Circulation statistics for the main collections were steady. Following are the average circulation statistic for each area:

Adult fiction – 8201 per month Junior picture books – 6374 per month Junior fiction – 3588 per month Non-fiction – 5239 per month.

The library resource funding allocation from the Northern Territory Library is on track to be all committed by the end of April. Our focus has been on updating the Health and Wellness, Biographies, Parenting and Adult Fiction collections. Collection sizes are maintained by regular disposal of out of date and well-loved books; this month we weeded the adult fiction and picture book collections at both Casuarina and the City libraries. The Nightcliff library has a limited non-fiction collection with most of the spending on current adult fiction and picture books for children.

Programs and Events

The City library hosted the 100th Anniversary Red Cross Digital Photographic Exhibition as part of the commemorative events for the 40th anniversary of Cyclone Tracy. A loop of images from the Red Cross showing their involvement in the cleanup after Cyclone Tracy will run to mid-January.

The Facing Tracy interactive photographic booth toured Karama, Casuarina and the City libraries during the 40th Anniversary of Cyclone Tracy commemorations in November and December. It is back at the City library and will officially close on 12th February. Both exhibits still attract visitors with an interest in Cyclone Tracy.

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ACTIVITIES REPORT



The Cyclone Tracy quilt exhibition was displayed at the Casuarina library during December and January and attracted visitors with an interest in craft and Cyclone Tracy.

The Waste Management staff organised a recycled art display in the glass display cabinets at Casuarina library during November for Recycling Week. The finished dioramas from the Windows on the Storm holiday program were also displayed as a Cyclone Tracy 40th Anniversary tie-in.

Loud @ the Library, Friday lunchtime musical performances, continued at the City and Casuarina libraries throughout the quarter.

Housebound services are provided from Casuarina and the City libraries and our customer numbers have remained constant throughout the quarter. We currently have enthusiastic volunteers who deliver the books each week, to both aged care facilities and private homes. Staff manage the deliveries in their absence.

Seniors at Karama is held monthly and activities for the quarter included yoga, a drama class and a poetry workshop. A small group of regular seniors attend the sessions and all are involved in selecting the activities for the yearly program.

The first Monsoon Cinema Club, held on Wednesday 12 November at Casuarina library, was a hit with 15 attendees and lots of positive feedback. The group has since decided to change to alternate Thursdays when the library is closed. The club has a Facebook page and was also promoted with an article in the NT News which helped bump up the numbers to 30 for the January showing.

Digital literacy classes are offered at all libraries. There is always interest in one-on-one sessions for specific needs. Staff have been assisting customers with email issues, resumes, tablets and smart phones and with downloading e-books and e-magazines.

ACTIVITIES REPORT

The Digital Hub funding ceased in January 2015 and a further report on the Digital Hub will be presented to the March committee meeting. The equipment and resources from the hub has been transferred to Nightcliff library and customers can book and receive targeted digital literacy help at Nightcliff. The 3D printer is also available for use at the library.

Staff Development Day - All staff attended a presentation and workshop by IT developer and futurist, Mark Pesce. The main message from his address was that for libraries to remain relevant they need to continue to "Connect, Learn and Share". He stated that libraries must embrace emerging technologies through continued connectivity platforms. He believed that libraries and those that work in them humanise the knowledge experience.

Children and Youth Services

This year we trialled a SWOTvac event during revision week for year 12 students studying for exams. We sent emails to the schools and year 12 co-ordinators and we had around 40 teenagers in total for the week; mostly different kids each night. They were polite, well behaved and the general feeling of staff supervising was that all enjoyed doing the shifts. We offered them a quiet place to study, computers (though most had their own lap tops) and we ordered pizza and had yoga on two evenings. Library staff received excellent feedback from those that attended and we will look at repeating the program again.

The KROC Awards were announced at Karama library in November. The KROC Awards allow local children in the Northern Territory to vote for their favourite books written by Australian authors. The event was attended by local authors Nick Bland, Johanna Bell, Barry Jonsberg, Clare Atkins, Dr Ilana Hoffman and Sandra Kendall.

Babes n Books Graduation – This highly successful program concluded for the year with the graduation of 87 babies from the course. Acting Lord Mayor, Jeanette Anictomatis presented the certificates to 104 very proud parents.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with an update on the 2014/15 Healthy Darwin Activelife@TheTop program.

KEY ISSUES

- The 2014/15 Healthy Darwin ActiveLife@TheTop program is a new initiative to encourage healthy lifestyle behaviours and stronger social connections in Darwin. The program will conclude on 30 June 2015.
- A calendar program of activities and events commenced in August 2014, fostering multiple stakeholder partnerships to enable affordable access to healthy lifestyle activities.
- An extensive evaluation framework has been used to assess the effectiveness of the program.
- This report includes a summary of the evaluation of the Dry Season 2014 and Wet Season 2014/15 programs.

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RECOMMENDATIONS

BACKGROUND

Council first supported an annual healthy lifestyle and recreation program in 2008. The program originally called DarwinLite, later renamed ActivateNT, was developed to encourage residents to become more active and enhance their knowledge of healthy choices.

Council requested an investigation of alternative program options which resulted in the Healthy Darwin ActiveLife@TheTop program being delivered in 2014/15.

DISCUSSION

Healthy Darwin Program Update

The Healthy Darwin ActiveLife@TheTop program was launched by the Lord Mayor on 30 July 2014 at Raintree Park during a free community event that included healthy lifestyle information, program details and mini health checks by Casuarina Community Care Centre.

A Dry Season program of activities commenced on 4 August 2014 and was promoted in an online and hard copy calendar. Activities transitioned to the current Wet Season program on 1 November 2014 (Attachment A).

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The program focuses on holistically encouraging healthy lifestyle behaviours including physical activity, healthy eating, mental wellbeing and stronger social connections in Darwin. The program objectives are committed to:

- fostering strong partnerships with local businesses, sporting clubs and community organisations to deliver a diverse mix of affordable and accessible health-based activities,
- building community awareness of opportunities to be healthy and active in Darwin,
- enhancing and celebrating public places and Council facilities, and
- encouraging social inclusion and community connections.

The program is divided into three specific output areas:

- Get Moving (weekly activities and programs): Wet and Dry Season activities, including subsidised weekly activities, walking groups, low cost group activities and come and try sessions.
- 2. **Be Informed** (education and workshops): healthy lifestyle workshops, social media, website information and information displays.
- 3. **Stay Connected** (events): support for community events, smoothie bike loans and pop up health checks.

A comprehensive evaluation process was developed using a number of domains to assess achievements and to ensure strategic objectives are met. The following methods are employed to evaluate the program:

- review of current best practice and literature,
- participant and supplier online surveys,
- individual activity evaluation (including facilitator and participant feedback, attendance sheets and staff observations), and
- anecdotal feedback at various time points.

A summary of key outcomes for the program for the period 1 August 2014 – 31 December 2014 are:

Program Delivery

- 73 regular weekly activities and events offered in the calendar program.
- 12 educational workshops including local cooking and gardening, safe cycling workshops for beginners and a six week learn to swim program.

Participation

- 281 residents are registered for the program.
- 208 residents have participated in the workshops and subsidised program.
- The most popular subsidised program is Healthy Moves for Seniors (attended by 42 community members), followed by the 'Life. Be In It' NT Lunchtime Circuit (attended by 20 community members).

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• The most popular workshop sessions so far have been fresh produce workshops with Market and Garden Cooking and Wet Season Gardening attended by 14 participants respectively.

 Attendance is not recorded for non-subsidised activities listed in the calendar program. Supplier online surveys indicate a number of new participants were attributed to inclusion in the Healthy Darwin calendar program.

Partnerships

- The program has partnered with over 39 suppliers and clubs to build the regular program including 8 key providers to deliver the following subsidised activities:
 - o Healthy Moves for Seniors, Coconut Grove Seniors Hall
 - o Tai Chi, Gardens Tennis Centre
 - Lunchtime Circuit, Civic Park/ Christ Church Cathedral
 - o Group Circuit, Koolinda Park, Karama
 - Tween Fit, Casuarina Secondary College
 - Stretch and Tone, Malak Community Centre
 - o Yoga, Lyons Community Centre
 - o Aqua Class, Casuarina Pool
- 24 community organisations and government departments at a collaborating and promoting level.

Benefit of Participation

- Over 93% of survey respondents agreed that they had experienced health benefits or an increase of skills as a result of participating in the program.
- 88% respondents stated the low cost of the program encouraged them to participate.

Additionally, officers have heard many passionate and diverse experiences from participants, many commented on the health benefits of participation – "I feel better with exercise – much more energy", some particularly loved the diversity of activities "the range of activities you offer is wonderful", others enjoyed connecting with others was most important to them "the social benefits are immeasurable".

Planning is well underway for the new Dry Season calendar of activities (1 April – 30 June 2015). This will focus on promoting the use of Council's outdoor spaces by partnering with service providers to deliver a range of free and subsidised exercise in parks and outdoor facilities across the municipality.

An additional amount of \$24,800 has been allocated from the Recreation Operational budget to consolidate the delivery of healthy lifestyle programs under the Healthy Darwin ActiveLife@TheTop brand.

A key focus of the program is to encourage and support local produce. The workshop program specifically delivers a number of information sessions that educate the public in areas of:

- local and seasonal food production, and
- support of community gardens and local producers.

The program will continue to coordinate with the Climate Change and Environment and Waste Management Team in planning future activities.

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The program encourages and promotes active travel and works to build the capacity of community members so they can cycle or walk instead of driving. Cycling workshops, regular ride groups and walking groups all contribute to a potential reduction in carbon emissions.

BACKGROUND

In 1915 Albert Borella undertook a journey of more than 1,000 kms from Tennant Creek to Darwin to enlist in World War I. He fought at Gallipoli and the Western Front and was awarded the highest honour for valour in combat, the Victoria Cross.

The Northern Territory Government through the Commonwealth Government's Anzac Centenary Public Fund is re-enacting the journey through a project entitled The Borella Ride 2015. The project is being managed by the Department of the Chief Minister and the Northern Territory Major Events Company Pty Ltd.

DISCUSSION

The Borella Ride 2015 commences on Friday 20 February 2015 in Tennant Creek and will visit towns and communities along the Stuart Highway concluding on Tuesday 3 March 2015 at Stokes Hill Wharf. The journey will be conducted by foot, horseback and train and will include a range of community receptions, educational activities, exhibitions and community based ceremonies. A commemorative plaque will be installed at key locations along the journey, including Darwin.

Borella Park, Jingili (Lot 3146 Town of Nightcliff) has been selected as an appropriate location to install the commemorative plaque. The park was named after Albert Borella and gazetted in March 1968, the year of his death.

The Northern Territory Major Events Company Pty Ltd is organising a small commemorative ceremony in the morning of Thursday 5 March 2015 at which the plaque will be unveiled. Key Northern Territory Government representatives, City of Darwin Elected Members, members of the local community and descendants of Albert Borella himself will be invited to attend the ceremony.

DISCUSSION

City of Darwin's Lord Mayor was invited to lead a delegation to Haikou to attend the first Haikou Sister Cities Summit and United Cities Local Government World Council in November 2014. This coincided with a long term discussion had by the Haikou Sister City Community Committee for the Lord Mayor to visit Haikou for the purpose of furthering the Sister City relationship.

Council resolved to accept the Mayor of Haikou's invitation to attend the conference, additionally a 2.5 day delegation itinerary was prepared to precede attendance at the conference. The Lord Mayor extended an invitation to stakeholders including Northern Territory government, media outlets, community groups, not-for-profits and community organisations that had expressed interest in developing relationships in Haikou, to join the delegation. The final delegation list included representatives from:

- City of Darwin,
- Haikou Sister City Community Committee,
- Northern Territory Government,
- Charles Darwin University, and
- Kormilda College.

Haikou Highlights

The itinerary was developed to meet the needs and interests of the delegation members. Highlights included:

- Identifying potential Sister School partners for Kormilda College.
- Visit to Lao Ou memorial and discussions with the Mayor of Dongfang on ways to increase tourist traffic to the site.
- Meeting with Hainan Overseas Chinese Middle School to confirm participation in the next stage of the Life as a Teenager project.

At the conclusion of the delegation, Lord Mayor attended the United Cities and Local Governments (UCLG) World Council, Fourth General Assembly of Asian Mayor's Forum (AMF) and First Haikou Sister City Mayors' Summit. Highlights included:

- Reception with Secretary of Hainan Provincial Committee of the Communist Part of China, Mr Luo Baoming.
- Talking about Darwin and the importance of the Darwin and Haikou Sister City relationship to Haikou media.
- Participating in a roundtable discussion as one of 17 Mayors at the First Haikou Sister City Mayors' Summit.
- Meeting members of the Asian Mayor's Forum.

As evidenced in **Attachment C** Kormilda College was appreciative of the invitation to attend the delegation and found the opportunity to participate very worthwhile.

Conclusions

- Face-to-face meetings and site visits are an important element of international relationship building and should be maintained.
- There is potential for the relationship between Darwin and Haikou to grow to involve more partners.



Dear Lord Mayor

I would like to thank you for the opportunity to join the Lord Mayor Delegation to Haikou from 19 to 21 November 2014. It was a great privilege to be a member of this delegation, and the entire experience was immensely valuable and worthwhile.

Throughout the trip, it was evident that the opportunity for existing friendships to be strengthened was very successful, as was the creation of new friendships with members of the Chinese Government and community. All of these opportunities are key to strengthening Australia's relationships in this region at every level, and your leadership in achieving this was strongly evident at every engagement.

As you would be well aware, the evidence of Asia's rise as an economic power is one of the most successful developments of the 21st century. As noted in the April-June volume of the East Asia Forum 2013, it could account for more than half of global output in 2050. This economic growth is supporting change and development in all areas from trade and commerce to social media trends. Asia's rise provides Australians with unprecedented opportunities to participate in, and benefit from, the rapid change and growth in our neighbourhood.

Kormilda College believes that preparing students to not only embrace the opportunities, but also the challenges, that will emerge in our region is vital to supporting their success as global citizens. In particular, we have a strong moral imperative to support students to be Asia literate. This means providing students with the knowledge, skills and capabilities they will need in order to engage in our region. It means providing them with opportunities to develop their understanding of Asia, including the diversity of Asia. This will give students the confidence they will need to develop connections with our region and be able to compete in the global economy and, in doing so, maintain and improve their quality of life. Links and partnerships with schools and other organisations in this region are vital to helping us to achieve this, along with the support of the Australian Curriculum's cross-curriculum priority of Asia and Australia's engagement with Asia.

In recognition of the Melbourne Declaration on Educational Goals for Young Australians (2008) and the National Statement on Asia Literacy in Australian Schools (2011-2012), Kormilda College has established strong connections with the Darwin Indonesian Consulate. the Darwin City Council and the Asia Education Foundation (AEF). In addition to attending three Year 11 trips to Malaysia in 2009, 2010 and 2011, students and staff have developed a strong relationship with SMA Negeri 15 Surabaya, as a part of the AEF Building



Relationships through Intercultural Dialogue and Growing Engagement (BRIDGE) Project. Participation in this project has resulted in SMA Negeri 15 Surabaya teachers and students visiting Kormilda on an annual basis since 2011, and Kormilda students visited Surabaya in 2013 and 2014, with a trip planned for 2015. Connections with SMA Negeri 1 Ubud, and SMA Negeri 1 Mataram have also been established. Another connection with an Indonesian school, SMA Negeri 5 Ambon, has also been created as a part of the Darwin City Council Sister Schools Project. This relationship has been a great success with two students and one teacher from Ambon visiting Kormilda annually for the past few years. In addition to this, for the first time in many years, two students and one teacher from Kormilda College visited Ambon. This strengthened the bond significantly between the two schools, and two cities, and was a very positive experience for all involved.

Beyond Indonesia and Malaysia, Kormilda has established connections with other parts of Asia, including Laos and East Timor. Year 12 students have been visiting Laos since 2008 to complete community service, while our first trip to East Timor for senior Indigenous students to participate in community service was held earlier this year.

All of these relationships will continue to grow and develop as students and teachers connect with the support of technology and exchanges.

Kormilda College is now planning to establish a partnership with a school as part of the Darwin – Haikou Sister City Project. China will have a profound influence on the evolution of the global community over the community decades and this partnership will be crucial to supporting the development of the new Mandarin language program that the College launched at the start of this year. It would have been very difficult to initiate this connection without the invitation to attend the delegation to Haikou, which provided the opportunity to visit several schools and meet with staff and students.

Kormilda College is proud of the extensive engagement throughout Asia that has been established, and acknowledges and appreciates the ongoing support of the Darwin City Council to achieve this. There are many ways Australia can make a stronger contribution towards building positive relations with Asia. The College firmly believes that one of the most important is to build people to people relationships. These will outlast the vagaries of politics and policies, and ensure that with patience and time that we are able to integrate with confidence and success in our region.

Once again, thank you for the opportunity to participate in the Lord Mayor Delegation to Haikou. It was a wonderful experience that was not only of great benefit to my own personal and professional development, but will be of benefit to many other members of Kormilda College and the wider community as we work together to support our students to be able to engage with confidence in our region.

B. THAT a report be prepared on disability parking within the CBD focussing on the needs of people with disability working eight hour days.

DISCUSSION

Zone B Parking

Council received a request to investigate options for people who hold an Australian Disability Parking Permit and work full time in the CBD for Zone B parking.

City of Darwin Current Parking Concessions – Zone B

A person with an Australian Disability Parking Permit can park in Zone B for the first 6 hours for free. After the first 6 hours, normal parking restrictions apply. Therefore, a person completing an 8 hour working day is allowed to park in Zone B all day, but must return to their vehicle after 6 hours and pay for the last 2 hours (\$3.40). It can be difficult for people with a disability which effects mobility to return to the vehicle each day to purchase the ticket for the last 2 hours.

After consultation with Corporate Services and Regulatory Services it was decided to run a four month trial, from 1 December 2014 to 31 March 2015, for people with an Australian Disability Parking Permit to be allowed to park all day for free in Zone B. It was considered that this would have minimal impact on revenue and parking. Throughout the four month trial Regulatory Services Officers will collect data on the number of vehicles with an Australian Disability Parking Permit that park all day in Zone B. This will assist in making a long term decision. At the DAC meeting on 20 November 2014 the Committee supported this trial.

5. BUSINESS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MINUTES 17 JULY 2014

5.1. Peter Mahony Fishing Platform

A letter was received from the Place Names Committee of the NT to inform Council that the Committee has recommended the name 'Peter Mahony Fishing Platform' for the fishing platform located along Rapid Creek foreshore. The naming proposal will now be prepared for consideration by the Minister.

5.2. On-Street Car Parking Review

The Committee considered the plan provided by the Infrastructure Department which shows the new disabled parking spaces proposed in the on-street parking review. The Committee asked to be sent an electronic copy of the plan to be able to have more time to consider the plan and provide feedback.

Action: Sheree to email Committee members an electronic copy of the plan.

5.3. CBD Car Parking Report

Committee members discussed the CBD parking report which provided details on the current concessions for parking in the CBD for people who hold an Australian Disability Parking Permit. The report specifically addressed the request for pre-paid parking permits for people with Australian Disability Permits working full time in the CBD.

Action: Sheree to investigate options for a trial of pre-paid parking permits for Zone B parking for people with Australian Disability Parking Permits.

6. ACCESS ACTION LIST

6.1. Accessible Flooring

Committee members made some changes to the proposed application form for hiring the Accessible Flooring. The Accessible Flooring will be available for hire through Council's Customer Services.

6.2. Mitchell/Bennett Street signage

Signage to be reinstated in the next two weeks.

6.3. Lake Alexander Liberty Swing Shading

The Committee discussed the possible complications with shading the Liberty Swing and wanted to find out the best options.

Action: Nik to look into possible options for providing shade for the Lake Alexander Liberty Swing.

6.4. East Point Reserve Mangrove Boardwalk

Nik explained that to make this walkway accessible it would require a raised boardwalk the whole way along which would be a major project and expense. There would also be a lot of environmental factors to consider such as the moving primary dunes. The Committee discussed that it would be good to target particular areas within Darwin and look at the accessibility as a whole and also to create a list of possible long term projects.

Action: Sheree to start a long term projects list.

7. GENERAL BUSINESS

7.1. Advisory Committee Workshops

The Committee members who attended the workshops provided feedback to the rest of the Committee. The participants found it extremely beneficial, particularly learning about the other Committees and making connections on possible opportunities to work together.

7.2. Disability Awareness Week 2014

Feedback received:

- The Peter Mahony tribute at the Official opening was fantastic and very moving.
- Deckchair Cinema Night debate around whether it's best to choose a film which relates to disability but may attract a smaller crowd or whether we should show a 'blockbuster' film to get a bigger crowd to assist with fundraising. This will be discussed further at the DAW 2014 Debrief Meeting.
- Since the Week has continued to grow in the number of events, there were a few clashes with events on at the same time. A suggestion was made that it could change from Disability Awareness Week to Disability Awareness Festival to allow it to run over a longer timeframe and avoid clashes of events. This suggestion will be provided to the DAW 2014 Debrief Meeting.

7.3. Committee member name badges

A suggestion was made that Committee members should get name badges so that they can be recognised when attending disability events, particularly during Disability Awareness Week.

The Committee also suggested a profile sheet providing information on each of the Committee members would be valuable.

Action: Sheree to organise name badges and a Committee Profile sheet.

7.4. International Day of People with Disability 3 December

The Committee suggested that an event be held to launch the naming of the 'Peter Mahony Fishing Platform' on IDPWD.

Action: Sheree to liaise with NT Government to organise the event.

8. OTHER BUSINESS

8.1. Laneway Café Parap

Council received an Outdoor Dining application from the Laneway Café in Parap. The applicant sought to vary the standards by having tables next to the building line, and proposed to include tactile strips to re-direct the visually impaired away from the tables along the building line. Council was seeking feedback from the Disability Advisory Committee on the proposed plan.

DAC provided the following feedback:

- Strongly against this proposal, there is a very good reason for having the building line clear, it's very important for people with disability and no reason is good enough to change this.
- This cafe is very close to Territory Sports Medicine Physiotherapy which people with disability often have to attend therefore they are often traveling through this area.
- Large electric wheelchairs and scooters would have a lot of trouble travelling through that amount of space, particularly if needing to turn. This would be particularly difficult with the sign post and ramp there. And also if there is people with prams at the tables which take up even more space.
- The footpath across the road is also not in a good condition so there's also not an option to travel on the opposite side of road.

B. THAT Council continue to support young people's participation in Community life and Council projects through its commitment to facilitating a youth voice and that Council continue to refer to the Youth Advisory Group for youth comment when community consultation is required so that inclusion of the youth voice is supported and forms part of Council's community consultation processes.

DISCUSSION

The October meeting of YAG did not reach a Quorum.

The meeting was attended by the following guest speakers:

- Elmer Lee Haikou Sister Cities Youth Representative.
- Prue Brockhouse Office of Youth Affairs
- Frances Elcoate Youth Programs and Engagement Officer, City of Darwin
- Matthew Rehhrmen LAUNCH Media Zine contributor.

Elmer Lee – Haikou Sister City Youth Representative

YAG welcomed Elmer Lee, a 16 year old student from Haikou, who was a guest as part of his visit to Darwin, arranged by Council's Sister City program.

Elmer gave a speech to YAG about the Haikou/Darwin sister city relationship, highlighting the importance and significance of the relationship to Haikou international relations.

Prue Brockhouse - Office of Youth Affairs

Prue Brockhouse sought involvement from YAG in applying for the Chief Minister's Round Table of Young Territorians. Three YAG members expressed interest in applying for membership for 2015.

Ms Brockhouse also provided information to YAG about findings from the Office of Youth Affairs Youth Issues Survey. Each year Members of the Chief Minister's Round Table of Young Territorians canvass the opinions of young Territorians to find out what issues are most important to them. The results are then shared with the NT Government at their first meeting in February 2015.

Ms Brockhouse presented findings then sought comment from YAG on the information presented.

The top three issues identified by local young people in the survey were identified as the following:

1. Alcohol and Other Drug Use and Misuse

- 2. Bullying
- 3. Lack of things to do

In response to point three, YAG commented that a lack of things to do for young people of Darwin is not so much a lack of activities or infrastructure, but rather a lack of awareness of what is available. YAG members suggested the following strategies to increase awareness of youth events and activities:

- Proficient knowledge and engagement in social media platforms
- Youth friendly media pathways such as Facebook, Off the Leash, Hot 100, and
- School engagement.
- Development of Youth Mag publications that are designed and distributed by young people
- Identifying locations where young people spend time and promoting events in these locations. E.g. Casuarina, Bus Stops, Movie Cinemas, Skate Parks

In response to point two, YAG members were of consensus that bullying was still highly prevalent in their school environments. The group commented that solutions include more peer education programs and counselling support in schools that address both school yard bullying and cyber bullying.

Frances Elcoate - Youth Programs and Engagement Officer, City of Darwin

YAG welcomed Council's new Youth Programs and Engagement Officer, Frances Elcoate, who was in attendance to seek comment from the group on Council's newly developed LAUNCH Media program including a Youth Zine. YAG provided the following feedback on the publication:

- YAG agreed that this was an effective way to get young people involved in creating media for youth by youth.
- A good way to get information about youth events out to young people.
- A good way to promote membership of YAG to schools and community groups through its wide distribution.
- A number of members expressed interest in being involved in a regular YAG contribution. YAG agreed to attend the next zine planning meeting.

YAG Branding

Feedback was sought from YAG about rebranding the YAG logo and having it more closely aligned with LAUNCH branding. YAG members discussed the current logo, agreeing that the current branding needed to be changed to a more youth friendly and appealing image. The group agreed that aligning YAG more closely with LAUNCH advertising would make it easier for young people to make the linkage between YAG and City of Darwin Youth Services.

However due to a lack of Quorum, a formal consensus would not be able to be reached until the next meeting.

Involvement from YAG was also sought for a schedule of LAUNCH pop up gigs and cinemas to be held over the next 12 months. YAG members expressed 'in principal' interest, but asked for more details on themes and dates.

Council's Youth Services staff committed to providing a calendar of activities at the February YAG meeting.

Youth Week 2015

Youth Services officer initiated a brainstorm activity to encourage YAG members to input what they would like Youth Week 2015 to look like. The group identified a number of event options including:

- Motivational Speaker sessions: The group highlighted that during past youth weeks there were not enough opportunities for local role models engage with and build confidence in young people in the area through motivational speaking and engagement activities. The group suggested that these sessions could act as an effective way to build confidence amongst a diverse range of young people.
- YAG also expressed interest in participating in the LAUNCH @Youth Week 2015 wider program of events.
- YAG also suggested that it is important to involve Alderman and the mayor in more events. It was suggested by the group that Alderman be invited to participate in the Couch Surfing event during Youth Week.

Quiz 4 Dili Debrief

The Youth Services Officer and Trainee thanked YAG members for their great effort as a team leading into the event and their hard work on the night of the event.

The following points were highlighted during the discussion:

- The event was sold out with 120 people attending
- Event raised \$2.971
- Former Alderman John Bailey stated it was the most successful Quiz 4 Dili to date.
- Browns Mart Venue created a more enjoyable and vibrant atmosphere.

4. ICEBREAKER

Icebreaker run by Gabby White. Members introduced themselves and gave a scale of 1-10 on how they are feeling and on what their personal highlight for the month has been.

The meeting was opened by Gabby White. However there was a declaration of no quorum for this meeting.

5. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING

The minutes of the previous meeting on the 3 of September 2014 were endorsed as a true and accurate record (Georgia/Domino).

6. OTHER BUSINESS

6.1 Elmer Lee Haikou Sister City Youth Representative

YAG welcomed Elmer Lee, a student from Haikou joining the meeting as part of his visit to Darwin from 7 - 13 October. Elmer recently won first prize in an English Speaking

competition in Haikou, and was subsequently awarded a trip to Darwin through the Darwin/Haikou Sister Cities Program.

Elmer shared information about the Haikou/Darwin Sister City relationship, highlighting the importance of the relationship. Comment and discussion was sought from YAG to identify underpinnings of the Haikou/Darwin relationship and issues impacting young people in Haikou compared to those of Darwin. The group highlighted significant differences in transportation, education and housing structures.

6.2 Prue Brockhouse: Office of Youth Affairs

Prue Brockhouse sought applications from YAG for the 2015 Chief Ministers Round Table for Young Territorians. Prue highlighted some successful projects coming out of the Round Table in 2014 and some youth leadership opportunities that exist through membership. Two YAG members expressed interest in applying.

Prue also sought feedback from YAG on the Youth Issues survey undertaken earlier this year by Office of Youth Affairs. Each year Members of the Chief Minister's Round Table of Young Territorians canvass the opinions of young Territorians to find out what issues are most important to them. The results are then shared with the NT Government at their first meeting in February 2015. Feedback was sought from the YAG on these findings.

Top three issues identified:

- 1. Alcohol and Other Drug Use and Misuse
- 2. Bullying
- 3. Lack of things to do

On point three, YAG commented that there is not so much of a lack of things to do but rather a 'lack of awareness' of what is available. Ms Brockhouse supported this comment, stating that qualitative data collected supported this sentiment also.

In response to these findings YAG members suggested the following strategies:

- Proficient knowledge of how to effectively use social media platforms to promote widely.
- Youth friendly media pathways such as Facebook, Off the Leash, Hot 100, and
- School engagement.
- Development of Youth Mag publications that are designed and distributed by young people.
- Identifying locations where young people spend time and promoting events in these locations. E.g. Casuarina, Bus Stops, Movie Cinemas, Skate Parks.

In response to point two, YAG members stated that bullying was still highly prevalent in their school environments. The group commented that solutions should include more peer education programs and counselling support in schools that address both school yard bullying and cyber bullying.

Action: Chody and Domino to apply for Chief Minister's Round Table 2015.

Action: YAG to consult with peer groups and school stakeholders about effective promotional tools to use that can inform local young people about activities, services and programs available.

6.3 LAUNCH Update: Frances Elcoate, Community Events and Resource Officer and Matthew Rehrmann (Launch Quarterly Team representative)

YAG welcomed Council's new Youth Programs and Engagement Officer, Frances Elcoate, who was in attendance to seek comment from the group on Council's newly developed LAUNCH Media program including a Youth Zine. YAG provided the following feedback on the publication:

- YAG agreed that this was an effective way to get young people involved in creating media for youth by youth.
- A good way to get information about youth events out to young people.
- A good way to promote membership of YAG to schools and community groups through its wide distribution.
- A number of members expressed interest in being involved in a regular YAG contribution. YAG agreed to attend the next zine planning meeting.

Action: YAG members to attend next Quarterly planning meeting.

LAUNCH Branding & YAG Branding

Feedback was sought from YAG about rebranding the YAG logo and having it more closely aligned with LAUNCH branding. YAG members discussed the current logo, agreeing that the current branding needed to be changed to a more youth friendly and appealing image. The group agreed that aligning YAG more closely with LAUNCH advertising would make it easier for young people make the linkage between YAG and City of Darwin Youth Services.

However due to a lack of Quorum, a formal consensus would not be able to be reached until the next meeting.

Action: Rebranding to be included as agenda item for November meeting.

Action: Youth Services staff to identify possible local artists and trainers to facilitate rebranding for 2015.

6.4 YAG Pop Up Involvement

Involvement from YAG was also sought for a schedule of LAUNCH pop up gigs and cinemas to be held over the next 12 months. YAG members expressed 'in principal' interest, but asked for more details on themes and dates.

Action: Council's Youth Services staff committed to providing a calendar of activities at the February YAG meeting.

6.5 Youth Week 2015

Youth Services officer initiated a brainstorm activity to encourage YAG members to input what they would like Youth Week 2015 to look like. The group identified a number of event options including:

Motivational Speaker sessions: The group highlighted that during past youth weeks there
were not enough opportunities for local role models engage with and build confidence in
young people in the area through motivational speaking and engagement activities. The

- group suggested that these sessions could act as an effective way to build confidence amongst a diverse range of young people.
- YAG also expressed interest in participating in the LAUNCH @Youth Week 2015 wider program of events.
- YAG also suggested that it is important to involve Alderman and the mayor in more events. It was suggested by the group that Aldermen be invited to participate in the Couch Surfing event during Youth Week.

6.6 Quiz 4 Dili Debrief

The Youth Services Officer and Trainee thanked YAG members for their great effort as a team leading into the event and their hard work on the night of the event.

The following points were highlighted during the discussion:

- The event was sold out with 120 people attending.
- Event raised \$2.971.
- Former Alderman John Bailey stated it was the most successful Quiz 4 Dili to date.
- Browns Mart Venue created a more enjoyable and vibrant atmosphere.

5. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING

The minutes of the previous meeting on the 8 October 2014 were endorsed as a true and accurate record (Maruop/Domino).

6. OTHER BUSINESS

6.1 National Ethnic and Multicultural Broadcasters Council Media (NEMBC) Conference

The NEMBC, in partnership with the Multicultural Youth Northern Territory, presented the 2014 NEMBC Youth Media Conference. Young people from diverse backgrounds were invited to share their experiences of community radio broadcasting and media, and given a chance to network with media/journalism aficionados.

It was the first time the NEMBC had organised a youth event in Darwin, with 70 Young people attending the conference.

Domino Bidwee, Krshna Capaque and Maruop Bol from YAG attended the conference and provided the following feedback to YAG:

- The event was valuable in helping them to build their communication skills in areas of radio broadcasting and public speaking and general confidence building.
- The event also enabled young people to network with their peers and workshop media and communication strategies with local mentors from the media and communications industry.
- The event was good, having an expert issue based panel on hand, assisting the group to learn about key issues impacting multicultural Australia such as Asylum Seeker policy impacts.

Action: Richelle to distribute information on the conference content and NEMBC organization information to YAG via email.

6.2 Kevin Kadirgamar: Multicultural Youth NT. Radio Project 'Tectonic Radio'

Given the recent success of the NEMBC Media Conference and the interest YAG has shown in local media broadcasting. Kevin from Multicultural Youth NT came to speak with YAG about an opportunity for the group to get involved in a weekly radio program on Darwin FM titled 'Tectonic Radio'. The program is focused on providing interesting topics around future movers and shakers locally, regionally and internationally. There are varying segments and My NT are always looking for more speakers and ideas for segments.

Feedback was sought from YAG around interest and ideas for segments. The group agreed that it would be a great opportunity to learn skills in broadcasting opportunities and other communication tools. The group also stated that it would also be a good avenue, currently not being used, to promote the YAG to the wider community. Members stated also however, that if YAG were being promoted using this medium, there would need to be a clear promotional message to send. Otherwise the exercise would not be clear and achieve a great deal of impact or reach.

6.3 Youth Week 2015: Guest Speaker Sarah Tam Perez. UN Youth NT

At the last meeting YAG members expressed interest in leading a ted-talk style project for youth week 2015 that provides a series of inspirational and motivational talks for young people by local and possibly out of area role models.

To help inform planning and shed light on the event process, Sarah Tam Perez was invited by YAG to come and speak about her experience coordinating Darwin's first TED X Forum

for young people in 2013. Sarah shared lessons learned and highlights of her experience coordinating the event and emphasized that out of all of the events that she has coordinated, this was by far her favorite. Sarah discussed strong capacity of motivational talks to really emphasise 'idea generation' and 'sharing of ideas' between peers, stating the importance for young people to be inspired and galvanized to pursue their goals.

YAG agreed to go ahead with a TED X Style forum for Youth Week and the group all also agreed that this would be a project of great interest and benefit to young people of Darwin.

YAG members stated that they thought that it was really important to provide local young people with role models who have achieved success in a range of areas, to show them that they too can achieve their goals, and to also realize their ideas and share their ideas with others.

Action: The group agreed to move forward with this as a key project to undertake for Youth Week. The group will utilize Facebook group to post ideas for speakers and venues. A pre-planning meeting will be held 3 December with details to be finalized.

RADIO FREQUENCY IDENTIFICATION (RFID) FOR LIBRARIES SUBJECT:

BACKGROUND

In October 2013 FE Technologies supplied and installed a RFID self-service system at the City Library. Prior to this library staff undertook all circulation duties, including checking items in and out.

In August 2013 in the lead up to the installation, stock at all four CoDL locations was RFID tagged and encoded. This enables all CoDL items to be borrowed or returned at the City Library using the RFID kiosks.

The system is working well and has been well received by customers. People of all ages find the self-check kiosks intuitive and easy to use. Customers are not only happily checking out their own items, but also checking them back in. The technology has proven to be very reliable and stable. Instead of issuing and returning books, staff are able to provide a higher level of customer service out on the library floor.

CoDL is now looking to extend the benefits of this technology to other libraries, initially Casuarina Library followed by Nightcliff and Karama Libraries.

DISCUSSION

Casuarina Library

Casuarina Library currently has two self check machines which use old (non-RFID) technology which only allows items to be checked out one at a time. Self check-in is not possible.

At six years old these machines are past their use by date. In the last two years there have been numerous instances of the machines either breaking down or not coping with high levels of use, causing frustration to both customers and staff. Even when the machines are working well they are not intuitive, resulting in the security gate alarm being set off because items have not desensitised properly. Embarrassed customers who are trying to do the right thing are regularly pulled aside to have their bags checked, which has a negative impact on customer service provision and library image. Other customers refuse to use the machines currently at Casuarina Library due to past negative experiences.

Installation of accessible RFID self-check machines will provide a much higher level of stability and reliability and customer service. The new technology is more efficient, as up to 20 items can be checked out at a time and check-in is enabled. Long queues at the circulation desk during busy periods would be a thing of the past. Selfservice also offers a borrowing option that some customers prefer for privacy reasons. Installation of RFID at Casuarina Library would provide continuity of service to our customers who are already using the RFID kiosks at the City Library. Much of the costly and time-intensive preparation work has already been done, including RFID tagging of the entire library collection.

RFID consultant Alan Butters visited CoDL in November 2012 to assess the libraries for RFID suitability. He advised that due to the high turnover at Casuarina Library,

installation of RFID self-service would not only provide customer service benefits but also productivity gains. A RFID-based system will result in faster handling of items and provide efficiencies through streamlined circulation processes. There will effectively be a reduction in circulation desk staff costs due to customers issuing and returning their own items. Staff on the floor will be freed up to provide a higher level of specialist customer service including provision of digital literacy help to customers, an area of growing demand. Staff will be able to spend more time engaging in other library services such as community programs. A more reliable system will also mean that less staff time will be spent dealing with errors, downtime and frustrated customers.

Other benefits of RFID technology include:

- increased security, including reduction in theft and false alarms
- collection management efficiencies, including stocktake and locating missing items
- Work Health Safety (WHS) considerations, including reduced repetitive strain injuries and low electromagnetic radiation
- positive library image
- increased staff morale (State Library NSW, 2013)

Requirements:

- Equipment (including 4 self-loan stations, 2 security gates, 2 external return chutes and 3 staff circulation assistants), training and delivery - \$73,060 ex GST (FE Technologies).
- Installation and library modifications, including removal of old equipment, installation of new equipment, electrical and data cabling work, redesign of reception area - \$29,000
- New reception desks \$19,385

Total: \$121,445 ex GST

Ongoing costs - maintenance per annum is \$5,450 (provided free for the first year after installation).

Karama and Nightcliff Libraries

Installation of RFID at Karama and Nightcliff Libraries will realise many of the benefits noted above for these two smaller CoD libraries. Both staff and customers will benefit from all four CoD Libraries using the same system. There are also cost savings, in both materials and staff time. At present all new library resources are end processed twice over, once to meet RFID requirements and secondly to comply with the barcode/magnetic security strip system that Casuarina, Nightcliff and Karama Libraries still use. When all libraries convert to RFID, end processing of new resources will be quicker and cheaper.

The funding agreement with the Northern Territory Government enables the City of Darwin Libraries to utilise funds for the "continuing operation of current library sites".

DISCUSSION

Eye of the Explorer – Public Art

The Eye of the Explorer was installed in Bicentennial Park in 2005 as a public art memorial to John McDouall Stuart. The work is comprised of three main components:

- 1. Glass and sand mosaic water feature,
- 2. Stuart descriptive tile wall and seat, and
- 3. Approach paths, steps and ochre paving.

In response to a number of maintenance issues an assessment of the work was completed by artist Techy Masero in April 2013, **Attachment B**. The assessment identified maintenance issues and provided options for the future of the public work.

The report listed a number of issues to be addressed in relation to the work, including:

- · paving at different levels,
- drainage issues resulting in water ponding.

exposed electrical cables and connections, and

 deterioration of plumbing, silicon component of mosaic trays and stone columns.

The report provided four options for consideration:

- 1. Maintain the artwork in its current form
- 2. Address immediate safety issues by converting the artwork to a "dry" structure
- 3. Remove the water feature
- 4. Remove the artwork in its entirety

At the 12 September 2013 ACDAC meeting the Committee concluded the assessment report work met the criteria for removal outlined in Council's Public Art Guidelines, as being "beyond reasonable repair". Based on the Committee discussions and the professional advice presented, the Committee proposed that the current memorial be scheduled for removal.

In November 2014 the Committee conducted further discussion regarding the sculpture 'Eye of the Explorer' and the costs associated with repair and maintenance presented to the Committee at previous meetings, and made the decision to recommend to Council that the sculpture be removed from the City of Darwin collection.

3. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING

4. BUSINESS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MEETING

Out of round recommendations (via email) agreed to by committee members and now minuted:

Committee Membership: The current membership is 16. Three members have resigned due to other commitments, the total number is now reduced to 13 and no further members will be sought at this stage.

Committee Terms of Reference were presented to members together with Meeting Procedures. Members recommended that these be accepted with the deletion of 'Addressing the Meeting' – *All members at the meeting should direct comments through the Chairperson.*

Member resignations: Frances Bunji Elcoate (Independent Artist, now a staff member), Jason de Santis (Independent Artist as he is required to travel between Tiwi and Melbourne and unable to attend regular meetings but will stay in touch), Trevor Cox (General Manager Tourism Top End) – Trevor will remain a key stakeholder for the group.

Members then spoke about the possibility of introducing a proxy system as a possibility to keep actions moving when members were unable to attend meetings. The Coordinator advised that she would look into what was possible and report back to the Committee.

Permanent Public Art Commissions:

Four permanent commission applications were received and all four rejected. Two did not comply with basic guidelines and the remaining two did not meet artistic merit required for the commission.

The Coordinator to continue to work with local artists in determining obstacles or difficulties in meeting basic criteria – this could mean a simplified process of application. The Coordinator will also provide feedback to applicants this round and continue to work with emerging artists in achieving excellence and success. A further round of Public Art Commissions to be promoted but will include an invitation to submit targeting local artists. It will remain an open round allowing all applicants to demonstrate their ability to meet guidelines and criteria.

'Eye of the Explorer' public art on the Esplanade

Committee members recommend that 'Eye of the Explorer' be deaccessioned, and that the Coordinator contact the artist to ascertain interest in re-use of tiles.

Civic Park Cultural Usage Plan

Committee members discussed priorities and focus to implement actions. These were:

- Lighting
- Coffee Food/Vans
- Steering Group
- Seating
- Signage to toilets (including bus stop depot toilets)
- Events pack
- More Shade Trees
- Temporary Sculptures
- Part Time Manager/Coordinator

The Committee felt that activities in Civic Park could include Friday night performances/music/pop ups an opportunity for organisations like Corrugated Iron Youth who actively seek opportunities to perform.

Committee members felt that there are many models and precedents around the country that have enlivened city parks and brought to life inner city areas creating opportunities for local artists, but also improving city connections.

The Committee fully supports the activation of the Civic Park Cultural Usage Plan and will be actively seeking a budget allocation to enable the implementation of this vision.

The Committee also felt that there were some items from the implementation and action plan that could be actioned immediately:

- Free Wi-Fi
- Browns Mart could house infrastructure as an interim solution
- Website promoting a program of activities
- Set up a Steering Group to focus on priorities and outcomes, this could include a plan for nominated spaces of activation, develop a tender for interested parties, develop opportunities for pop up food vans/coffee carts etc.

Coordinator advised committee members that a report addressing these issues was drafted and ready to be presented to Council at its next meeting. 17 November, 2014.

Cultural Village Poles

The Coordinator reported that the Botanic Gardens were no longer an option for the installation of the Poles. The Poles continue to be housed in a container and an option to install them in a community garden was agreeable to the Cultural Village Group. Options for installation included Jingili Water Gardens and Lakeside Gardens and the Committee felt that Lakeside Gardens was an excellent place for the Poles. Recommendation was made to relocate Poles to Lakeside Gardens. The Coordinator will continue to liaise with the Cultural Village group and Lakeside Gardens and report back to the ACDAC Committee.

5. **GENERAL BUSINESS**

5.1 Trading Ideas

Coordinator provided feedback to members who did not attend the Trading Ideas Forum which focussed on creative investment between the Northern Territory and the Asia Pacific region.

Members were advised that The Lord Mayor presented some details of the Darwin City Centre Masterplan the thinking behind it. This panel discussion also included some insight into city development from the City of Sydney's strategic advisor lanto Ware.

Members who attended the forum also shared some thoughts and discussed key issues, one of which is the difficulty and freedom of travel for international artists, having to wait on visas, costs for accommodation whether this is an area that could be looked at in terms of support from local government. Mention of the process that Festivals benefit from through the

Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) which addresses the issue of approval for travel is a good example. 150 people attended the forum.

5.2 Opportunities for 2015

Arts Marketing and Promotion:

The issue of poster placement and the opportunity for marketing and promotion was again raised. Members felt the current approach is restrictive and it was worth looking at models for example in Brisbane. Members provided a number of examples of innovation in this area and pointed out that this was a key priority highlighted in the Five Year Arts Plan and an ongoing issue for the sector.

The issue of advertising versus arts marketing was raised and clarity was provided to members that the City of Darwin has clear policies relating to advertising and signs and we would need to be mindful of this. The Coordinator to look into this in more detail and report back to the Committee.

Artist Residencies/Arts Initiatives

Darwin Community Arts will continue to bring Artists from Asia and deliver exchange programs. They plan for 6 more residencies and have an interest in any initiatives either through supported accommodation and or available infrastructure assets or partnerships for eg. Stella Maris (National Trust Assets).

Coordinator mentioned the Mayfair Gallery initiative in Harriet Place and the opportunities and vision currently being discussed with the Lease holder. This is still in development and the Coordinator will provide updates to the Committee when more detail is known.

5.3 Live Performance and Participatory Art

Garrmalung Festival won 2014 Best Cultural, Arts or Music Event for NT. The Festival is a partnership between Darwin Entertainment Centre (DEC) and Larrakia Nation. Garrmalang is an old Larrakia word for what is now the CBD.

DEC, Artback NT, Tactile Arts, ArtsNT (Arts & Health Conference), DVAA, CDU (Honours Exhibit), all gave updates on current and future programs and events to look out for.

5.4 Arts Program Updates

Coordinator gave members an update including:

- advice that the public art panel would reconvene early 2015
- report to Council on Civic Park Cultural Usage Plan and recommendations
- Red Cross, upcoming exhibition in Community Art Space as part of Cyclone Tracy 40th Anniversary program
- Facing Tracy, digital art program tour program
- National Arts and Culture Forum October meeting in Darwin

5.5 Committee Members key priorities for sector

- Opportunities for public art including the possibility of re-introducing a temporary sculpture program in Civic Park
- Artist residencies, opportunities for subsidized rent, or affordable housing to support sector initiatives
- Arts Marketing and promotion

Public Art Work Current Assessment - Eye of the Explorer

Public Art Work: "Eye of the Explorer" – corner Daly St / The Esplanade

Assessment by: Techy Masero.

April 2013

Issues to be addressed:

Item	Condition Report
Paving	Sinkage of paving stones around the concrete base has created uneven surfaces, the paving stones no longer meet the concrete base creating a trip hazard.
Drainage	Sinkage of the concrete base has led to the uneven distribution of water over the fountain and 'ponding' of water around the sculpture
	Due to uneven levels of both the fountain and the base, water is not being directed down drains
Plumbing	The exposed plumbing is deteriorating rapidly, metal fixings in the water pipes are rusting and corroding
Electrical	Electrical cables and electrical connections to the pump are exposed, creating a safety risk
Mosaic trays	There is deterioration of the silicon component (glue and sand) around the outside edges of each tray. Requires replacement.
	There is wear and tear to the handmade ceramic tiles in the mosaic which were salvaged from the original mosaic and included during the repairs undertaken in 2007. The longevity of the ceramic pieces is probably 1-2 years.
Rock Cairns	The rock cairns which support the water feature are deteriorating due to a combination of rusted metal fixings (plates/bolts), running water and exposed plumbing.
Wall seat and steps	Wall seating and steps are in good condition. Routine maintenance in the form of regular re-sealing of the ceramic tiles in the wall seating will be required to preserve their condition.
Lighting	There is no lighting of the artwork at night. Lighting of the artwork would improve amenity in the area.

Options for Council's consideration:

1. Maintain the artwork in its current form

The cost to maintain the artwork in its current form for another three to five years is estimated at \$40,000 plus the costs of ongoing regular maintenance. This would allow for the removal of all elements including the water feature, concrete base, paving, plumbing and electricals, resetting the artwork and stainless steel trays to the right level, resetting plumbing and electricals and rebuilding the rock cairns, resetting "Briggs" paving to the right level and laying a new concrete centre.

2. Address immediate safety issues by converting the artwork to a "dry" structure

The cost to address immediate safety issues pertaining to trip hazards and exposed plumbing and electricals, by repaving the ground area and converting the sculpture to a "dry" structure (disconnecting power and water from the sculpture), is estimated at \$10,000 to \$20,000. The artist's approval must be received for this to occur.

3. Decommission the water feature

The cost to remove the water feature and rectify the paving / concrete area is estimated at \$10,000 to \$20,000.

4. Decommission the artwork in its entirety

The cost to decommission the artwork in its entirety and rectification of the turf is estimated at \$15,000 to \$20,000. The opportunity to commission a new artwork to mark this site was also proposed.

In the event that part or all of the artwork is decommissioned, the artist will be invited to reclaim that work.
